The end of term is a great time to reflect on what we have learnt, what we have enjoyed and what our challenges have been.

We have all had the experience of asking children 'What did you do today?' with a response of "Don't know", "Nothing" or even a shrug of the shoulders. We need to direct our questions so children not only have a change to share their day but to reflect on their day. Try asking 'What was the best thing you did today?" and if possible follow up the answer with 'Why?"

The ability to reflect on ourselves and our lives is an important skill for many reasons.

It helps you learn from your mistakes. If we reflect on those mistakes, figure out what went wrong, see how we can prevent them in the future, we can use our mistakes to get better. Mistakes, then, are a valuable learning tool, instead of something to feel embarrassed or upset about. Reflection is an important way to do that.

It makes you happier. If you reflect on the things you did right, on your successes, that allows you to celebrate every little success. It allows you to realise how much you've done right, the good things you've done in your life. Without reflection, it's too easy to forget these things, and focus instead on our failures.

It gives you perspective. Often, we are caught up in the troubles or busy-ness of our daily lives. But if we take a minute to step back, and reflect on these problems, and how in the grand scheme of things they don't mean all that much, it can calm us down and lower our stress levels.

Take the time to reflect on Term 3 with your children, find out what was the best thing, the most challenging thing, the thing that made them laugh and laugh. This time spent not only be a time of sharing but a time of learning the importance of reflection.

Grade 4 Camp




On the 14th of September, 24 excited Grade 4 students boarded the bus ready for their adventure to




Next we sat around the beautiful warm campfire and roasted some marshmallows. We then reflected on our day and told highlights while we watched the coloured flames flicker.
